Why is it important to know about HIV?

Many people believe that HIV will never affect them, but sometimes they are wrong. Some believe that only certain types of people get infected and that they usually have visible symptoms and look sick.

In reality, HIV affects people from all walks of life and symptoms may not appear for a long time. During this time, the virus can unknowingly be spread further if precautions are not taken. There are many ways people can contract HIV, some of which are associated with practices related to culture and traditions.

Have you been at risk of contracting HIV?

- Have you had unprotected sex (without using a condom) with someone whose HIV status you do not know?
- Have you shared injecting equipment?
- Have you had any medical procedures overseas? For example:

Blood transfusions

Dental work

Operations

If you have answered yes to any of these questions then you may have been at risk of contracting HIV.

PEACE Multicultural Services can assist you with information and support to make informed decisions about HIV testing, your health, your life and that of your loved ones.

You can work with a counsellor of your choice, with or without the support of a community educator.

Community education project officers

Our community education project officers assist in the development and implementation of our community education programs.
